

TIBBERTON COURT stands in its Situation.
own beautiful grounds of 26 acres,
and commands exquisite views of
the surrounding country.

It is situated five miles from Gloucester, and
one mile from Barber's Bridge Station on the
Gloucester—Ledbury Line.

The classrooms are all lofty, airy, and well School Buildings
lighted. The school is lighted throughout by
electricity generated by private plant.

An entirely new system of drainage has been
installed, and is on the most up-to-date and
approved principle.

There is central heating.

The water supply is drawn from the Gloucester
City mains. Fire hydrants and hose pipes are
fitted to every floor, and there is ample
pressure of water.

Aim.

Mr. Gairdner's chief object will be in the future, as it has been in the past, the development of the boys' characters and to ensure as far as possible that every boy when he leaves shall have laid the foundation of the character of a Christian Gentleman.

Since it is recognised that to achieve this end it is essential that each boy be induced to *do his best* in every direction, it follows that the religious, intellectual, physical and athletic sides must each receive proper attention.

Curriculum

The curriculum of school work is based on the recommendations of the "Headmasters' Conference." It comprises Scripture, Latin, Mathematics, French, History, Geography, Drawing, Class-Singing, and English. All these, as well as Physical Training and Games are included in the School Fees.

Additional subjects which are generally taught are Greek and Science to older boys when sufficiently advanced, and Nature Study to younger boys.

Optional extras are Instrumental Music, Dancing, Shooting, Carpentry.

Curriculum
(continued).

The classes are small so that boys can receive a proper amount of individual attention.

All the house-keeping and catering arrangements are controlled by Mrs. Gairdner, and all questions in relation to the boys' clothes and outfit should be addressed to her.

Domestic
Arrangements.

The only food-stuffs allowed to be brought or sent to boys are plain cakes and sweets, and these must in no case be considered the sole property of a particular boy for his own consumption only. They must be handed round.

The diet is liberal and care is taken to give it as much variety as possible.

The health of the boys is under the direct care of Mrs. Gairdner, assisted by a matron of great experience.

Health.

There is a sick room adjoining the matron's room, and also a sanatorium, apart from the school, for any infectious cases that may arise.

Health*(continued).*

It is hoped that as far as possible boys will pay visits to the dentist during holidays, so that trouble to their teeth may be avoided during term.

Each boy is required to bring back with him a certificate of health at the beginning of each term.

Physical Culture and Games.

Careful attention is paid to physical development.

There is in the grounds a playing field of five acres and great attention is paid to games, especially that boys shall learn to play them correctly and in the proper spirit.

Recreation.

Opportunities are given for boys to interest themselves and obtain instruction in such handicrafts as carpentry and gardening.

There is a useful School Library from which boys can take out books. Books are added every term.

Swimming Bath.

A Swimming Bath has been added to the equipment of the School. The Bath is covered in and the water can be heated, so that swimming can be indulged in every term.

The fees are £40 per term and are payable Fees. in advance.

A term's notice is required of the intended removal of a boy; in lieu of such notice a term's fees will be charged.

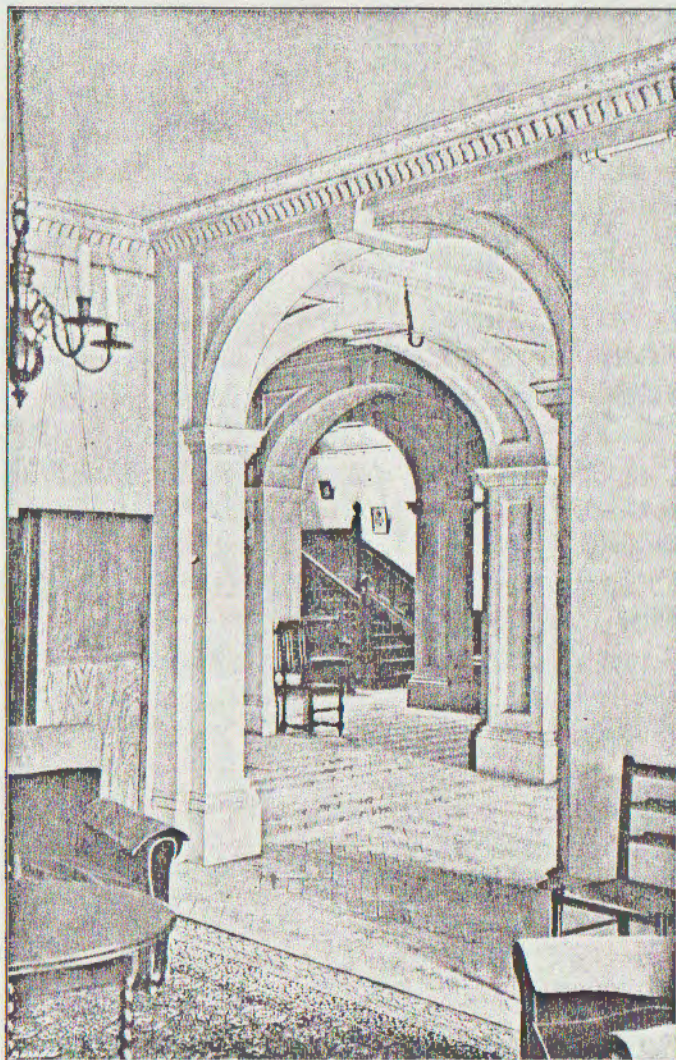

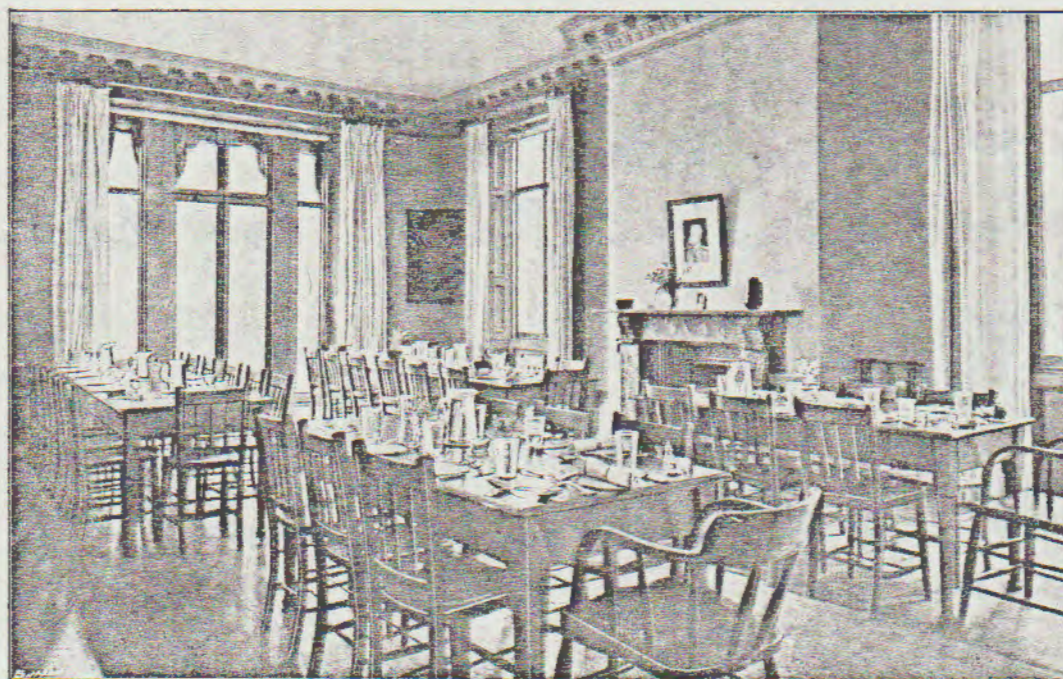

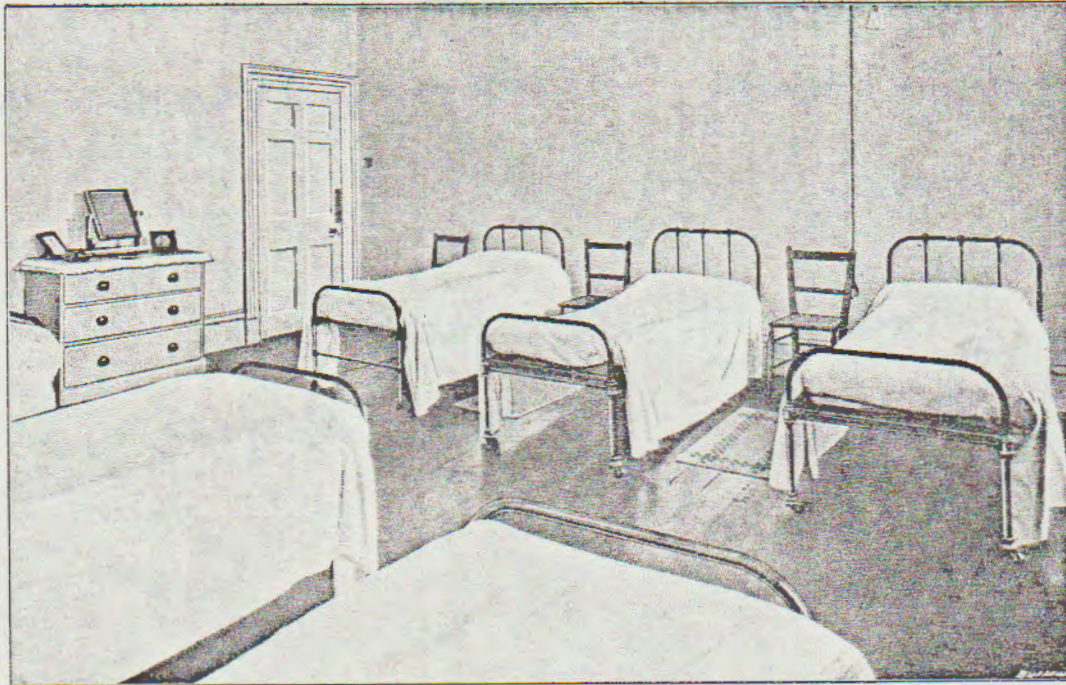

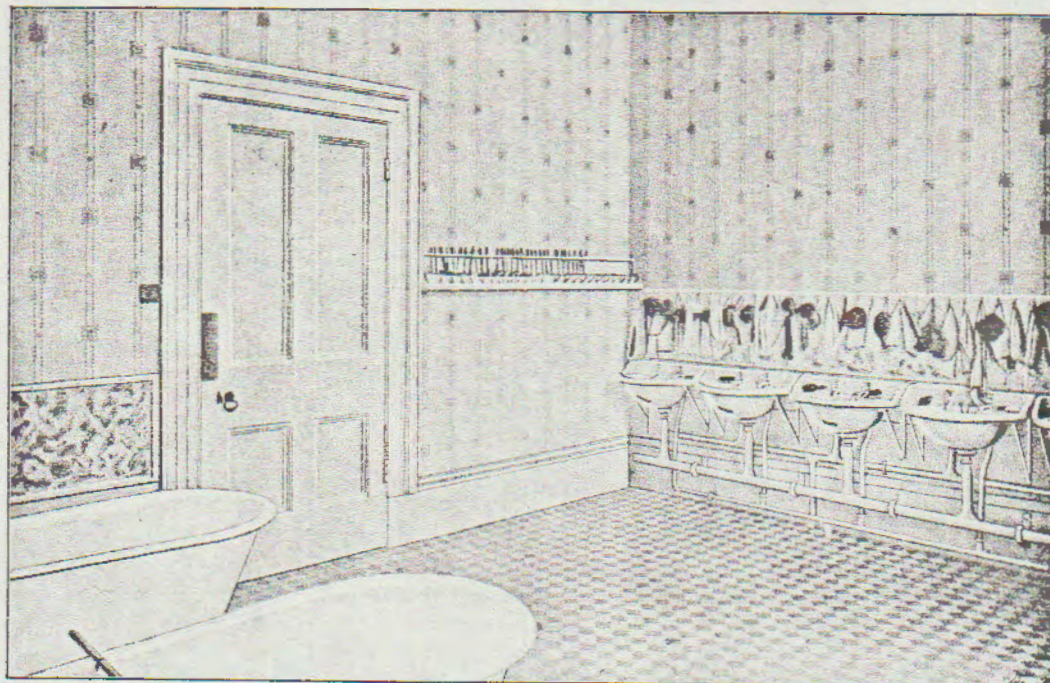

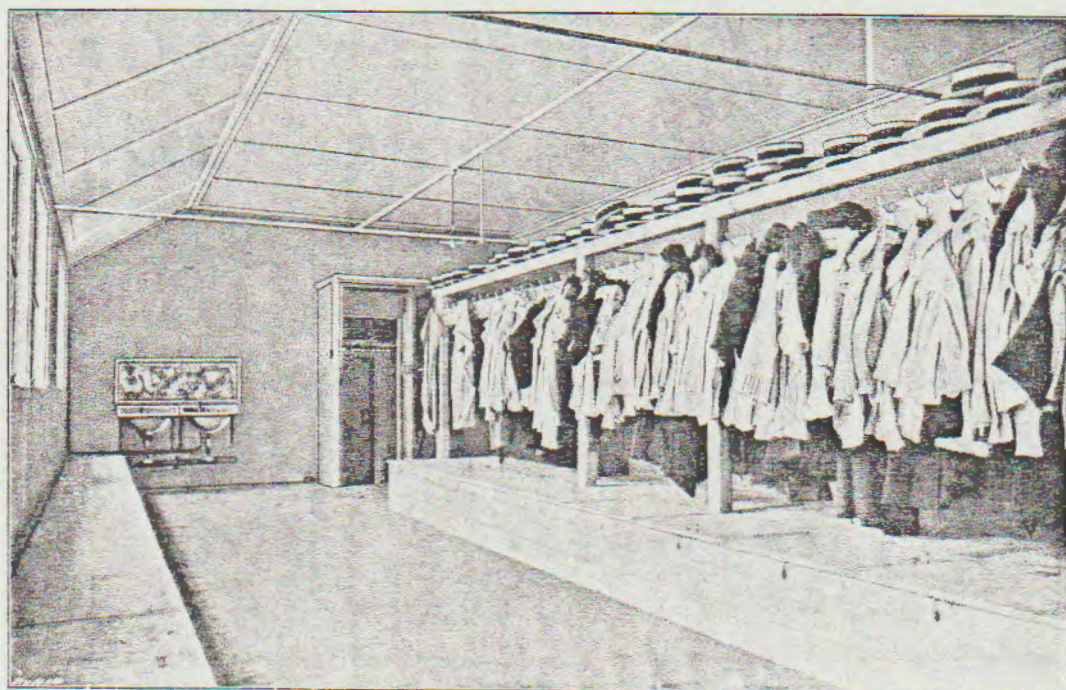
